15 Kittens Abandoned in a Sealed Tub Outside of Animal Samaritans

Thousand Palms, CA – September 24: Rhona Linsell, a Pet Adoptions counselor for Animal Samaritans since 2001, arrived for work early Thursday morning to find a blue, medium-sized tub sealed shut with packing tape. At first she heard nothing. Once she pried open the top she knew it had animals; inside the tub were 15 kittens. According to Linsell, the smallest ones weren't moving.

"There were no air holes for these little guys," explained Linsell. "Thankfully the weather was cool this morning. Had it been your typical summer morning in the desert, they might not have made it." The animals are all currently under the care of Animal Samaritans. Each is recovering and is said to be in good health.

The "Tub Club" kittens have been de-wormed, weighed and examined for general health. They appear to be born from three different cats, and range in age from 4 to 7 weeks. There are orange and white tabbies, grey tabbies, calico mixes, and several combinations of all three. The five youngest kittens will be fostered by Animal Samaritans' staff and volunteers until they can live on their own at the Animal Samaritans shelter. Once each kitten has received her primary vaccinations, pet microchip, and has been spayed or neutered, Animal Samaritans will offer them for adoption.

Because the organization has a reputation for being an affordable vet clinic with a no-kill animal shelter, Animal Samaritans is no stranger to unwanted animals. Since January of this year, 22 animals have been abandoned outside their doorstep—that's not counting the Tub Club kittens. Occasionally they find a puppy or dog, but Linsell says people generally abandon kittens.

"This latest instance is particularly disheartening," notes Animal Samaritans' Director Fred Saunders. "In fact, it's downright criminal."

According to California's penal code 597s, "Every person who willfully abandons any animal is guilty of a misdemeanor." If caught, the perpetrator of this animal abandonment could be fined up to 6 months in jail and \$1,000 cash—for each animal. Additionally, because the kittens were sealed in a tub with no air holes, the suspect or suspects could be charged with animal cruelty, a felony which carries a maximum penalty of \$20,000 per offense and several years in prison.

Given their ability to survive imminent suffocation and dehydration, Animal Samaritans has named the Tub Club kittens after tribes from the popular TV show *Survivor*. The six girls and nine boys are named: Casaya, Chapera, Jaburu, Kucha, Maraamu, Mogo Mogo, Nakum, Pagong, Pooka Pooka, Saboga, Samburu, Tagi, Tambaqui, Vivero, and Yasur.
